I had the privilege to attend the graduation of Johana Cardoza Lemus, Project Salvador's first scholarship student to graduate from medical school.

I first met Johana in 2007 when I was living and working in her village as a Peace Corps Volunteer. At that time she was one of the top students in her ninth grade class. She was planning on continuing her education in high school, with the dream of one day studying medicine in college.

Johana received a Project Salvador scholarship that helped her cover the costs of attending high school. Upon graduating from high school her generous sponsor offered to pay for her eight years of medical school!



Johana is the seventh of ten children and is the first of her family to graduate from college. Her father is a subsistence farmer and her mother operates a small store out of the house. Her family and community are incredibly proud of Johana for everything she has accomplished.

From the very beginning
Johana said that if she became a
doctor she wanted to stay in El
Salvador and give back to her
community, with the hopes of
one day opening her own clinic. Dr.
Johana Cardoza Lemus is currently
working at a local hospital and
hopes to continue her education
and specialize in internal medicine.

Updates from Radio Victoria

Election Reporting

Starting at 4:30 a.m. on February 3rd, Radio Victoria 92.1 FM broadcast a team of 25 credentialed correspondents responding in real-time to the 2019 elections.

Our local audience in Cabañas and San Vicente stayed engaged, and even more Salvadorans tuned in globally, with thousands from the U.S. checking in via social media.

According to our community reporters, many voting centers were unprepared to open on time for reasons ranging from mismanaged Vote Reception Boards, to Salvadoran Civilian Police and Armed Forces members being denied ballot access (a violation of article 195 of the Electoral Code), to ink pads drying out, making it difficult to stamp ballots.

Radio Victoria worked into the night, reporting from Cabañas's 9 municipalities which represent 2.7% of all El Salvador's registered voters.

Project Salvador has funded Radio Victoria consistently since it was founded in 1993.

Politics and Women

"Women Also Talk About Politics" was a program presented before the elections to analyze each presidential candidate's platform to see if their programs took women into account. Our panelists found all to be lacking. The FMLN was the only group that made at least some clear commitments to social programs and laws that supported women. The rest of the candidates had only superficial and ambiguous "solutions" to common problems.
